Sir Charles Norris Nicholson Restoration Appeal



2018 is celebrating the 100th anniversary of women's suffrage. To coincide with this milestone the FoHPC have raised an appeal to have the grave of Sir Charles Norris Nicholson restored.

Nicholson was a Liberal MP and a supporter of votes for women. He backed a Bill in the House of Commons in 1908 and 1912 and also along-side this, was a tireless supporter for the rights of disabled soldiers both during and after the First World War.

International Enquires

One of the lovely things about being involved with Friends of Hyde Park Cemetery is when we help people to find the graves of their loved ones. This often also leads to revealing information about their family history that they were unfamiliar with.

This year we have had a few requests from overseas and one of the graves was of Anthony Steel Caldwell (pictured right). Anthony was from Australia and was killed alongside his pilot in a flying accident at Doncaster Aerodrome.

Anthony's relative contacted the Friends to confirm his place of rest and we were able to send pictures of the grave, alongside the information we had on Anthony at that time.

The family were delighted and subsequently sent us more information on Anthony, including his photograph and a picture of his plane. The family are keen on having his grave restored and are hoping to visit the UK in the near future so hopefully we'll be able to show them around the cemetery and help them with the restoration.





In July the cemetery was visited by a lady who now lives near Nashville, Tennessee, whose grandmother is buried at Hyde Park Cemetery.

We had the privilege of showing her the grave, where not only her mother was laid to rest, but also her infant sister (d.1931, aged 2yrs).

XP School

Earlier in the year the XP School contacted the Friends regarding a project they were doing on the Railways and how they impacted Doncaster's development. The Friends were delighted to help the school and after a few meetings and correspondence our Chair, Andria, met and led groups of children around the cemetery where they visited a number of graves relating to their topic.

Stories were told to the children and they in turn asked Andria questions about the railways and about the life of the people who worked there. The school was able to get a lot out of the visit and they were able to use this knowledge in a number of subjects including English and Art (some of which are shown below).

Due to the success of the project the school are wanting to run another walk, this time on the subject of WW1 & 2. This project will be run in September so we'll let you know any developments in our next newsletter.

Alongside the walks, the school are keen on improving the wellbeing and fitness of their students and so gardening is one of the things that they have included in their plan. They are passionate on being able to deliver this to students in a community setting rather than just within the school and so we are working alongside DMBC and the XP to find a permanent plot for them to develop. This in turn would then be maintained by their own Duke of Edinburgh gardening club and would be a great opportunity for the Friends to involve the younger generation in maintaining the cemetery.









Doncaster Local History Fair 2018

In April the Friends attended this years Local History Fair which was held at Doncaster Museum. This is always a lovely event to be involved with and a good opportunity for our members to meet other local organisations at the same time. Alongside this it's a great way for our group to advertise ourselves to the wider public and in turn learn more about Doncaster.

The event was well attended and we were able to meet people who had relatives buried in the cemetery, some of whom had very interesting stories to
