JOE DUDDINGTON GRAVE MARKING APPEAL 2021

Help us to remember an important figure in railway history

In July 1938, the Mallard A4 Pacific Class steam locomotive set a new steam locomotive world speed record reaching 126 miles per hour. This record remains unbroken.

The driver of the Doncaster-built Mallard was Joseph Duddington, an experienced driver of the LNER. He was hand-chosen by the Mallard's designer, Sir Nigel Gresley. Joe lived with his family in the Hyde Park area of Doncaster and worked for the LNER until his retirement in 1944. When Joe died in 1953, he was buried in an unmarked grave in Hyde Park Cemetery, Doncaster.

We want to mark his grave and give him the headstone he deserves. We need to raise over £2000 to make this a reality. We need your help.



Joe Duddington Grave
Marking Appeal.

Joseph (Joe) Duddington was born in Doncaster in 1876. His father Thomas worked as a railway fireman and Joe followed him into the railway industry. Joe married Mary Alice Lane in December 1900 at Christ Church, Doncaster. The couple lived together with their children in Doncaster. Mary Alice died in 1921 at 103 Catherine Street, the family home. She was 41. Joe married Florence Goodlad in 1935.

On the 3rd of July 1938, Joe drove Mallard on its locomotive world speed record breaking run, with fireman Tommy Bray. Joe worked for the LNER until his retirement in 1944. In his later years he lived in Dunsville, Doncaster.

Joe died on the 3rd of April 1953, aged 76. He was buried at Hyde Park Cemetery and his grave was unmarked, until 2021.

Our initial target was £2000, enough to get a basic headstone for Joe and Mary Alice's grave. As the donations started rolling in we realised the appeal had become something very special. We not only hit but far exceeded our target.

Donations were made by supporters of our work, railway history enthusiasts, fans of the band Big Big Train, local organisations, trade unions and more.



The Headstone


We began the long process of developing the headstone with J&M Memorials. This initial mock-up gave us an idea of what the final headstone would look like...





The new headstone was dedicated by Rev. Cpt. McCarthy of St James Church, with speeches from Rt Hon Dame Rosie Winterton MP and Councillor Glyn Jones, Deputy Mayor.

Many branches of the extended Duddington family were in attendance, some of whom had never met!




















The Bench
